Below is a letter to our Bishop Nominees from the members of the Episcopal Diocese of Bethlehem. This letter is a culmination of the responses to Rev. Canon Ruth Woodliff-Stanley and Rev. Canon Kevin Nichol's questions from prior bulletins.

Dear Kevin and Ruth,

We are incredibly blessed and honored to have both of you as our Bishop Nominees for the Episcopal Diocese of Bethlehem. You will be joining a group of people who are committed to our faith and each other. We are a spiritual home free of judgement and inclusive of all.

Ensuring that we can continue our mission is most important to us, whether it is through new members or empowering our youth. We also have major challenges in our society, and we need to be there to help our community members deal with difficult issues like addiction, mental illness, poverty, and gun violence.

Our Diocese is both beautiful and vulnerable. The beauty includes the celebrations where we All gather to worship, e.g. The Chrism Mass, Ordinations, Services at Conventions and Retreats. The unbelievable architecture and worship spaces throughout this Diocese and the wonderful smiles of love and joy when we greet one another are also beautiful. The Vulnerable includes the gathering for sorrowful or painful worship/pastoral ministries and sometimes the focus on our differences instead of what unites us. The genuine love and affection expressed every time we gather is sustaining, regardless of our personal difficulties or tensions. We know without any doubt that we are welcomed with all our faults, all our sorrows, all our doubts, and yes, all our sins.

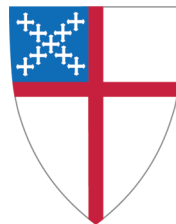
